Kurfürstendamm – Where past and future meet

The City West is alive and well! Kurfürstendamm boulevard has seen many changes – but always kept its vibrant diversity.



This quarter also offers great art down the ages – surrealism in the Scharf-Gerstenberg collection, modernist art in the Berggruen Museum and art nouveau in the Bröhan-Museum. smb.museum; broehan-museum.de

A new quarter is rapidly developing around the Zoo. The legendary Zoo Palast cinema and the adjacent Bikini Berlin shopping mall have had a major makeover, combining the latest architecture with 1950s designs and styles. Directly opposite, the 32 floors of the 118-metre-high Zoofenster skyscraper soar skywards.

The heart of the quarter is the landmark Kaiser Wilhelm Memorial Church on Breitscheidplatz. As home to both the Museum of Photography and the re-opened photo gallery C/O Berlin in

Amerika Haus, City West continues to grow its reputation for exhibitions of photographic works. For luxury shopping, just stroll down Ku'damm, as Berliners say, towards the setting sun - and past one exclusive boutique after another.

If you are more into impressive 19th-century town residences and that touch of French lifestyle which comes with boules players on magnificent tree-lined boulevards, then Charlottenburg's Schloßstraße is the place to be. The start of the boulevard is flanked by neo-classical twin buildings housing major museums and collections. Directly opposite, Charlottenburg Palace evokes a past of elegant luxury, while the idyllic gardens and grounds are perfect for a relaxed stroll. During the Christmas season, the baroque palace provides a stunning backdrop for a romantic Christmas market with an impressive light show.



Urban life to the power of three

Pankow offers three in one: chic and trendy Prenzlauer Berg, Prussian architectural heritage in Pankow, and a young arts scene in Weißensee.

Prenzlauer Berg is famed for its special lifestyle: cool, creative and cosmopolitan! Locals meet for a leisurely breakfast in the cafés around Helmholtzplatz and Kollwitzplatz, or stroll through the famed Mauerpark or down Oderberger Straße. At the nearby Kulturbrauerei on Eberswalder Straße, you can explore "Everyday Life in the GDR" in the eponymous exhibition.

Even far beyond Berlin's borders,

The original borough of Pankow was solidly respectable, attracting wellknown figures in German life present and past, such as writers Hans Fallada and Christa Wolf. Close to Pankow's Schlosspark – the old palace gardens -, Schönhausen Palace is a real insider tip, taking you back in time over three centuries. A cabinet exhibition in the gatehouse offers an insight into the area after 1945 when many top East German government functionaries lived here and on the nearby Majakowski Ring villa estate.

The Weißensee locality is home to Europe's largest surviving Jewish cemetery - with over 115,000 graves, a unique monument of cultural history. The prestigious Weissensee School of Art and Design, directly in the vicinity, has become the centre for a lively gallery scene.

A special zest for life

The Berlin Wall long divided the two traditionally working class boroughs of Friedrichshain and Kreuzberg, but when the Wall fell they quickly grew together again. Today, there's a fresh surprise on every corner - from street artists and offbeat characters to fruit döner kebab! The districts are joined across the River Spree by the landmark Oberbaumbrücke

The Osthafen, a former industrial harbour reborn as a hip media centre, stretches east along the Friedrichshain riverbank. To the west, you can stroll past the art works on the famous East Side

Gallery - the longest surviving stretch of the Berlin Wall. In summer, locals and visitors soak up the sun on the green area behind, directly at the river, waving to the tour boats and relaxing to the urban beat.

Moritzplatz is renowned for its mix of culture, design and creativity. Here, you can find such neighbourhood favourites as Gallery Kai Dikhas, showing Roma and Sinti artists, the Prince Charles Club and Theater TAK. And just when you think it can't get more creative, it does - with Planet Modulor's Imago 1:1, the world's only walk-in selfportrait camera.

Where opposites attract

Reinickendorf offers something for everyone – from nature lovers to architecture buffs, and sport fans to families.




he Weiße Stadt has been listed as UNESCO World Heritage since 2008. This modernist residential estate, with its striking white façades and green courtyards, was inspired by the New Objectivity architectural movement

inscribed as UNESCO World Heritage in 2008.

When the 1920 land reform created this borough from six villages, it paved the way for today's vibrant Reinickendorf. Since the 19th century, the green district of Tegel has attracted day trippers to its forests, the Tegeler See lake, idyllic bathing beaches, attractive harbour and the manor house belonging to the famous Humboldt brothers. Visiting Lübars village, with its charming farms, village school and baroque church, is like travelling back in time to a

Wittenau combines grand 19th-century unesco.de/kultur town houses and modern high-rise estates, such as the modern Märkisches Viertel quarter. In bustling Reinickendorf, the Weiße Stadt is well worth a visit – a 1920s modernist residential estate

The Frohnau suburb, with its elegant villas and stylish houses, was founded in 1910 in the wake of the garden city movement. Neighbouring Hermsdorf was famous for its brickworks, and donated bricks for Berlin's Rotes Rathaus town hall. German expressionist artist Max Beckmann had a studio house set slightly back from the road in Ringstrasse. In the Cold War, the Wall oddly enclosed a narrow East German street nicknamed the "Entenschnabel" (duck's beak) protruding into West Berlin.





Making waves in the 'hood

Lichtenberg lives the contrasts - high rises, nesting storks, avant-garde art and beach life at the popular Rummelsburger Bucht.

One of Lichtenberg's most attractive venues is the beach bar at the Rummelsburger Bucht bay. The shoreline path to south Lichtenberg is flanked by boats and bathing beaches and green sunbathing lawns and heritage buildings. The Andere Haus VIII is a real insider's tip! The hotel in this revamped 19th-century prison now comes with all mod cons – in the best sense of

Lichtenberg's young art scene is also booming, with workshops, studios and galleries. Artists such as Spanish painter Gustavo spruce up former East German tower blocks, bringing splashes of colour to the district. But Lichtenberg is also home to a very different side of life with sites commemorating Stasi persecution – such as the Hohenschönhausen Memorial and the Stasi Museum at Normannenstraße. In contrast, north Lichtenberg is a green area with an almost rural charm. Its small urban centres are set in landscaped parks, on lake shorelines, and in popular beauty areas. And Malchow and Falkenberg boast the only pairs of nesting storks in Berlin, celebrated every year at the "Stork Festival" in June.

The Kaskelkiez neighbourhood to Lichtenberg's south-west was once home to a renowned Berliner - artist and photographer Heinrich Zille. The district's landmark is the 40-metre-high Schrotkugelturm – Lead Shot Tower - where lead shot was cast until the late 1930s.



Young at heart!

Spandau is older than Berlin. When the first settlements were established here in the 7th century, the rest of Berlin was just wilderness!

Spandau has the oldest signs of settlement and civilisation in all Berlin. The ideal place to get your bearings is the 30-metrenigh viewing platform on the Juliusturm tower - part of the 16th-century fortress known as the Zitadelle (Citadel). The thick walls of the fortress contain some exciting finds from past eras.

A short walk takes you to Spandau old town with its charming alleyways and half-timbered houses. This is also the site of Berlin's oldest annual Christmas market. The early neo-classical manor house

in the beautiful Gutspark Neukladow is set in enchanting park grounds. From 1800 to 1806, the house was the home of the mother of Otto von Bismarck, Germany's "Iron Chancellor". Today, you can take a seat in the Kulturpark café or the spreading beer garden and enjoy the stunning views across the Wannsee lake.

Further to the north, the picturesque Gutspark Groß Glienicke manor park and grounds are set on the shores of a lake. A piece of the Berlin Wall stands lost on a meadow, recalling the border that divided Germany for so many years. On a walk along the shoreline, you can still see the remains of the old border complex – a reminder of the history of the division of Germany. There's more history further east with a ruined tower, an old well and the family grave of the estate's owners set in the overgrown grounds.



The most striking new art works include the balancing act by Hubertus von der Goltz's metal Acrobats on the roofs of Eisenacher Strasse and the Flower Tower's colourful façades. The Alte Börse Marzahn site is set with charming brick buildings, open spaces and old trees inspiring artists and visitors alike – a place where the arts and crafts flourish, and home to many cultural events. The Braustube, a small artisan brewery, offers hearty dishes to accompany its own local beer.



Steglitz-Zehlendorf

Magnificent mansions, grand residences

The imposing houses in Berlin's elegant Lichterfelde-West residential area were inspired by every style from Tuscan villa to English country house and medieval castle!



The Allied Museum, housed in the US Army's former cinema and library, tells the story of the Western Allies in Berlin.

In the 19th century, Berlin's well-to-do longed to live close to the city centre, yet surrounded by countryside. That dream came true in the upscale estates in Lichterfelde-West in Steglitz, an island of tranquillity in the bustling big city. In the nearby Botanic Garden, the Seasonal Trails are perfect to explore the exotic world of plants.

The Zehlendorf district has no less than three of Berlin's best-loved bathing lakes -Wannsee, Krumme Lanke and Schlachten-

see. Wannsee also offers many popular sights, including Pfaueninsel or the summer residence of German Expressionist artist Max Liebermann.

The House of the Wansee Conference, today a memorial and educationa site, presents a dark chapter in German history. At the Kleiner Wannsee lake, Heinrich von Kleist, a leading figure in German Romanticism, is buried with his lover Henriette Vogel. The Acoustic Kleist Memorial audio tour takes you back in time to the events around Kleist's suicide here 200 years ago. This area also features the Dahlem Museums showcasing non-European art and culture, the Brücke Museum presenting German Expressionist artists, the Kunsthaus Dahlem exhibition venue, and the Düppel Museum Village, a reconstruction of a medieval village.

A vibrant bar scene has sprung up in the Reuter and Schiller neighbourhoods, and ever more small bars and pubs are opening their doors in the side streets in

north Neukölln.

Locals enjoy relaxing in the spreading Britzer Garten, one of Germany's most attractive parks. Even in old Imperial Germany, Berliners came to Rixdorf to relax and enjoy, away from humdrum everyday life. Traditionally, this Berlin suburb offered everything for a good time out - from beer gardens to clubs, dance events and music halls. Today, when people talk about Rixdorf, they mean the old centre of Neukölln around Richardplatz. In the mid-eighteenth century, settlers from Bohemia moved here and their historic houses can still be admired today. The adjacent Körner neighbourhood, as it is today, is home to the neo-baroque Körner Park from 1916 with its fountains and an orangery, now a café and exhibition venue.
